MUNICIPAL PROGRAM

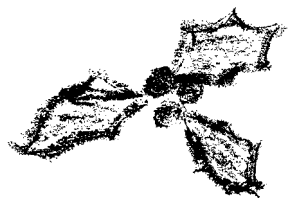

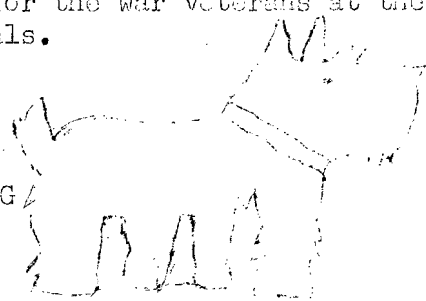
The children of Miss Alexander's room have been working hard on the scenery for the Christmas Program.

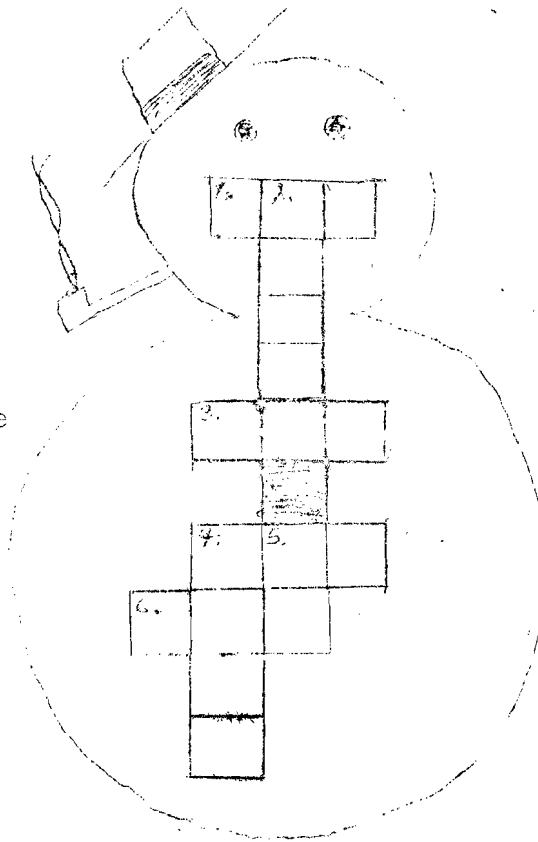
CHILDREN'S THEATER
