


There were 1,540 who enrolled on August 31, 1960. Over 100 were new to McCallum and the Austin Public Schools. The final number is not known yet, but McCallum expects to enroll about 1,800 for the first semester. The sophomores and juniors are expected to numher about 650 each. The seniors should enroll about 500.

McCallum has 15 new teachers this year. The first one, Mr. Fred Brown has attended the Southwestern State Teachers College, also the University of Texas. He also acquired a B.B.A. degree from the University of Texas in 1956. He has taught for three years at Llano High School. He will be teaching general math and plane geometry.

Mrs. Dorothy Hutchison has graduated from the University of Texas with a Bachelor of Arts degree. She has been teaching for eight years, three years at Stephen F. Austin in Houston, two years at New Braunfels and two years at Round Rock High School. She

Former Teacher Dies After Illness

Mrs. Arnye Deats Johnson, algebra and geometry teacher known and loved by hundreds of McCallum students, died Monday, August 29, 1960, after an extended illness.

Mrs. Johnson had been at Mc-Callum since its opening in 1953. She began teaching at Elgin High School, and after four years there, she came to Allen Jr. High to teach mathematics. She taught at Allen for five years, and then moved to Austin High as study hall supervisor and attendance officer until 1953, when she came to Mc-Callum.

Mrs. Johnson was well known by many Austinites—most of them former students-and shall long be remembered by all McCallum students.

Her funeral was held Wednesday, August 31, at the Central Christian Church.

Hotrodders Halted

The Wednesday, August 31, edition of The Austin American carried a story concerning the police crackdown on teenage hotrodders. It stated that a new policy sent out by Police Chief Bob Miles orders all officers to begin giving "court case" citations to speedsters, especially those trying to escape.

Chief Miles' new policy is endorsed by the City Council and is designed to "shake the parents of teenagers into an awareness of their responsibilities as such and will cause our many fine young people to show, by their attitudes toward the guilty, just how childish and irresponsible they consider this conduct."

Court cases do not carry an immediately payable fine and offenders are tried in Corporation Court. A statement giving the facts will be attached to the citation. Parents of the offender will be notified of the violation by mail and are required to appear in court with their child.

This dangerous driving on the part of some young people is a major problem in Austin. The students and faculty of A. N. Mc-Callum High School can help to overcome this problem by encouraging safe driving habits. Only one wrong move on the part of a teenager puts every teenager under suspession. Let's do our part to erase this problem.

Marilyn was equally enthusiastic about her trip. She was a member of the Nationalist Party. Chair-

All of the activities interested Marilyn. The trip to Barton Springs, inaugural services, and attending Trinity Lutheran Church were some of the more enjoyable aspects. Marilyn was also appointed representative to Civil Defense Advisory Council held in Austin.

last spring by donations from pub-





The 1960-61 version of the Knight football team sports one of the biggest, if not the biggest, offensive and defensive lines in the district.

A quick run over the defensive unit sees the improved Hulen Akers, 194 pounds, at right end; the bearded wonder, David Lindsay, 222 pounds, at right tackle; mammoth Jerry Spillar, 245 pounds, over the middle; hard charging Dow King, 210, at left tackle: and promising Gaylen Jackson, 187, flanking the left

Rounding out a promising defensive unit are four tough linebackers. Martin Tyson, Adon Sitra, Danny Clark, and Ronnie May.

The all important halfback posts will be in the hands of Jerry Hanke and Bobby Jackson.

The line up should not be misconstrued. It is subject to change upon the better judgment of the

Looking at McCallum from an offensive standpoint, size again prevails. In the backfield, calling signals is Tully Embrey, in top form after recovering from a knee operation in the spring.

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
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
